


PROPERTY MAP

With over 1000 responses collected, The CRC staff is now equipped to make informed decisions with respect to planning and delivering programs and services. In 2013, John Robinson was named one of ten White House (Obama) Champions of Change for Disability Employment. In 2015, Our Ability, Inc. is presented with the Business Excellence Award in Small Business by the New York Small Business Development Corp. In 2018, John Robinson is presented with the Chamber Champion Award in recognition of actions that have advanced the mission of the Capital Region (NY) Chamber. In 2019, John Robinson is named to Governor Andrew Cuomo's Reimagine the Erie Canal Commission (for New York Economic Development).

John Robinson is the subject of "Get Off Your Knees: The John Robinson Story" a public television documentary seen around the world. Syracuse University Press published an autobiography of the same title in 2009.

How Understanding Ableism and Culture Leads to Inclusion

Our Ability CEO John Robinson will share stories of living with a disability and empowering others with disability to achieve employment success. Businesses will gain a better understanding of the ability within all of us as well as the financial impact in including everyone. Our Ability utilizes generative AI technology to build a better pathway to employment for individuals with disabilities. We are using the same technology to assist students on college campuses in finding education and career pathway. Additionally, we are building an ableist language filter that will work similar to Grammarly. Technology is the great equalizer for individuals with disabilities!

Transforming Career Practices to Increase ROI and Equitable Career Success

As higher education recovers from COVID, continues to address structural barriers to equity, and prepares for the projected enrollment cliff, it is essential that institutions use data to define career mobility, articulate the value of their degrees, and demonstrate how they are preparing students for success after graduation. At the intersection of career mobility, return on investment and equity is how institutions are transforming career practices to ensure the success of graduates after graduation. This session uses data from the National Alumni Career Mobility survey to answer questions like: 1) What career practices should higher education strategically invest in that will significantly benefit their graduates as alums? 2) Which of these high impact career practices are more likely to close equity gaps? 3) How can an institutional investment in career influence return on investment (ROI)?

Bengal Internship Award: A Stipend for Unpaid Internships

Unpaid internships disproportionately affect female students, students of color, and first-generation students – a large portion of Buffalo State's student population. In less than 1 year, Buffalo State created a stipend for students participating in an unpaid/underpaid internship. Gaining support from upper administration, along with collaborating with Institutional Advancement was critical to the success of the Bengal Internship Award. The award is now in its 2nd year, and we will discuss our successes, challenges and what we have learned. Finally, we will also include how social media played an important role in fundraising as well as advertising to students the Bengal Internship Award application.

Curriculum Integration: The Perfect Storm of ROI, Equity of Access, and Best Practices 26 High Street
